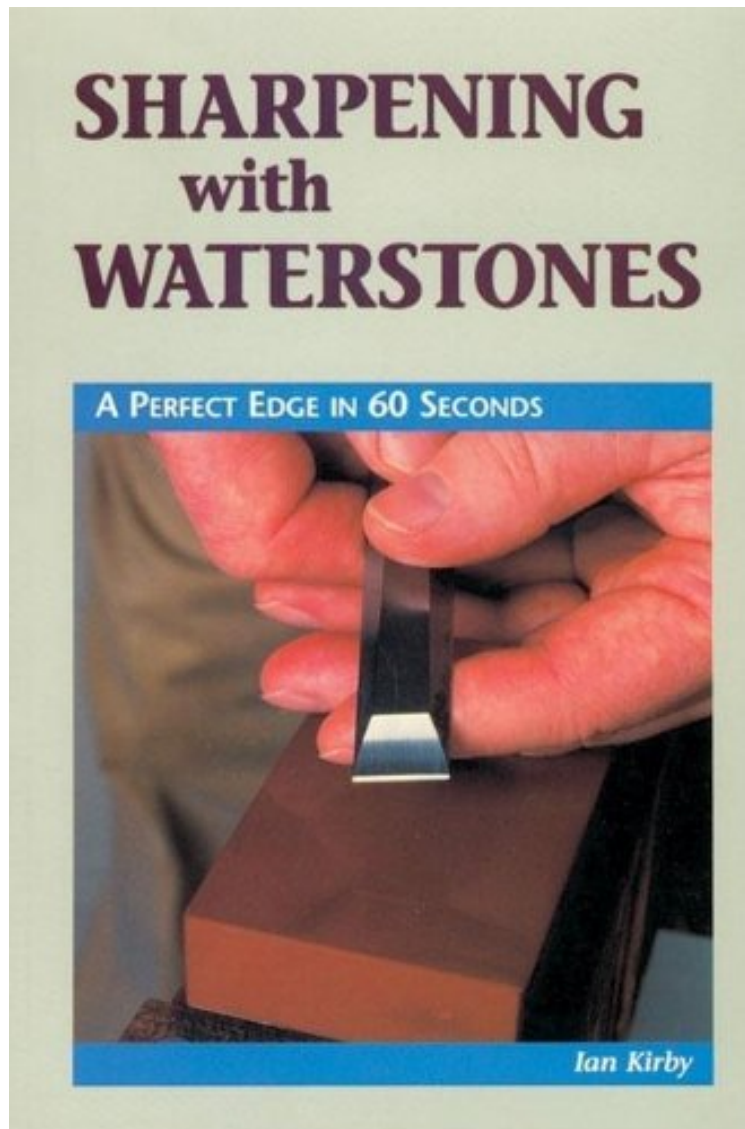

I've used many but this is the easiest and most inexpensive as well. My version is a little more portable and I use a different iron holder, but the concept is the same. As to the rest of the book - I tend to like, short to the point references. However, I'm not a big fan of Kirby and don't like his dovetailing book at all. I wouldn't have bought this one, but a friend had it so I got to preview it and saw that it would fit my needs. Paragraphs are short and to the point - easy to understand chapters such as "how do I know when my blade is sharp?" and "When do I need to regrind.?" Easy to reference later - the idea of the obvious of three stones keeps the basics in focus and helps me realize that I don't need all the dodads the sharpening industry tries to sell me. I feel bad for others who struggle now realizing that the most effective method takes the least time, costs the least and is the simplest to remember. Who would have thought?
