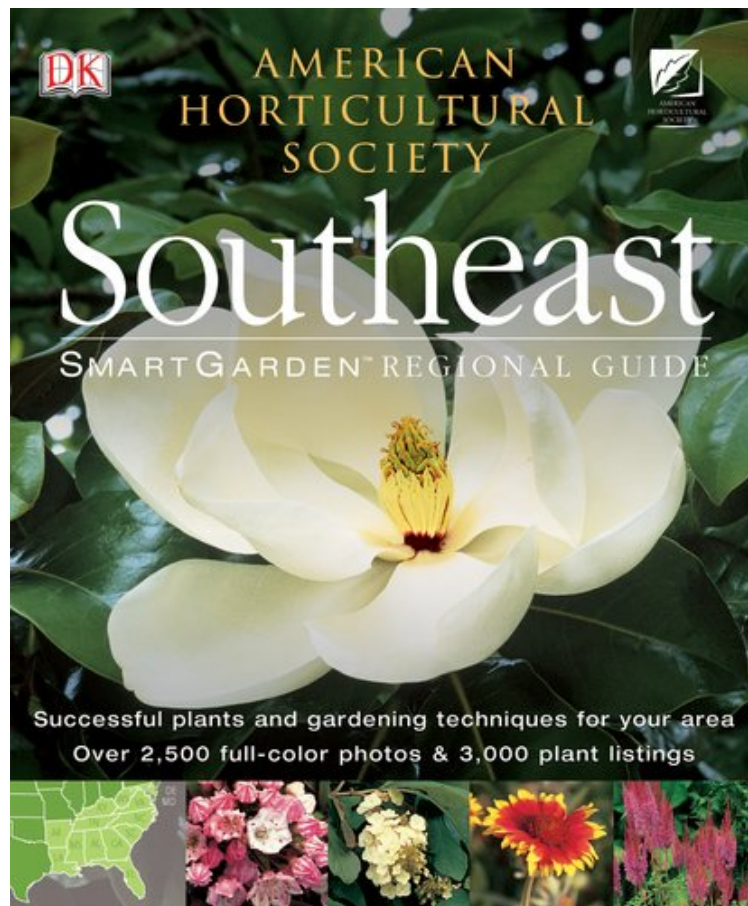

It has lots and lots of pretty pictures but very little written information. The entries are only about a paragraph long, but do contain critical information about sunlight/shade requirements, water requirements, size, zone and a brief description. A more thorough reference is "The Southern Living Garden Book", which I find more helpful. The two work well together - see a picture of a plant you like in AHS Southeast, do a quick check to see if it will survive where you are at, then go look it up in the Southern Living book if you want to actually

The book is good in the following areas: - Beautiful photos let you see clearly what you would be planting. - Good descriptions of conditions that plants prefer (pH, heat and frost tolerances, water) - Plants are arranged into useful categories (for example, fast-growing trees) - Contains the most popular plants for the Southeast. Despite this, I find that the book does not have enough variety of plants. When reading the different sections on trees or shrubs, for instance, many times the same plant is repeated in different sections. For example, the same plant could be listed as both a summer blooming tree and also a drought-tolerant tree. Not only that, but the caption on the image has the exact same description of the plant in both sections. I would have at least wanted some different insights into the plant when repeating it in a different section. Overall, I like this book for its wonderful photos and good coverage of the most popular varieties.
